Church Council Report

How is our church doing with respect to Earth Day? We are stewards of the Earth, how are we treating God's awesome creation? What can we do as a congregation to help? Most all of our lighting at church and the parsonage are energy efficient LED's. Light sensor switches have been installed where appropriate, saving energy costs and church members no longer have to go into church to turn off unused lights. We pay the town a garbage collection fee that includes a recycling bin, and when we recycle that helps keep the town's fee lower and reduces the garbage stream to the landfill. We have a pop can tote outside behind the church so everyone can bring their aluminum beverage cans in for recycling and provides income for the church. New windows and doors were installed at church and the parsonage several years ago replacing old leaky ones. Efficient air conditioning systems were put into the sanctuary to help make the services more comfortable. It is very expensive to insulate an older building like our church building, but we have done a good job of tightening up leaky areas. The Parsonage has the appropriate insulation in the attic, that was installed years ago. We have planted several carbon reducing trees and taken care of the ones we have. I think that we have done all that we can to keep our energy bills low and do our part with regards to climate change. Can we do more? Probably. But, there is only so much we can afford to do. The Trustees over many years have taken very good care of our buildings. I think our church is doing very well, for our part in taking care of God's wonderful creation.

Devotions with the Church Council this month focused on John 4:3-7, 28-29

He [Jesus] left Judea and started back to Galilee. But he had to go through Samaria. So he came to a Samaritan city called Sychar, near the plot of ground that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by his journey, was sitting by the well. It was about noon. A Samaritan woman came to draw water...

[missionally engaged, relationship-driven conversation] Then the woman left her water jar and went back to the city. She said to the people, "Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done! He cannot be the Messiah, can he?"

Pray with your heart and mind open to the movement of the Holy Spirit

Prayerfully imagine what it would mean to tag along with Jesus in your context.

Where will Jesus go? With whom whould he fellowship? What would he do?

And to ask ourselves the question, "Jesus, where do you hang out in this church? In this community? Pay attention to what comes to mind. What qualities of fellowship stand out for you in those places? Record your thoughts.

What is one thing Jesus might do if he were hanging out with you, how is he calling us to be in fellowship with him (with you individually, with the congregation, with the community).

Where are we and can we initiate and build relationships. Engagement seeks to ensure that outreach and evangelism efforts become a vital part of

an intentional system of discipleship. *Discipleship* begins with relationship. The church does not

undertake outreach to provide ministry for people but rather to be in ministry and relationship with people.¹

"Why" do we gather as the UMC, How are we, how can we walk together?

These are questions we all need to contemplate as we begin to prepare for the Post-Pandemic reality of our congregation, our community, and our world.





As we enter the merry Month of May we are still in the church season of Easter. The season of Easter lasts 50 days – from Easter Sunday until Pentecost. Pentecost Sunday 2021 is May 23, so most of the month is still part of Easter. In church history, Easter is the first holiday – holy day – celebrated weekly, on "The Lord's Day" – Sunday. A weekly celebration of the resurrection. Easter is our Reason for Being. It is our Proof. It is our Hope. If any day is a cause for celebration, Easter is it.

And yet, for years I have noticed a tendency to make Palm Sunday a "bigger deal" than Easter.

Palm Sunday has lots and lots of music. Often by multiple ensembles. Palm Sunday is Lively. Lots of laughter. Lots of chatter. Lots of noise. Lots of happy, excited people. It is almost as if people are unaware of What is to Come during the week we call Holy.

Very much like the first Palm Sunday.

Only Jesus knew and understood what was really going on.

Resurrection Day, by contrast, was a much quieter and more subdued event. No boisterous crowds, no fan-fare. An empty tomb. Terrified and awestruck followers. A blossoming, burgeoning Joy. Joy that is deep and eternal, not temporary and ephemeral. Joy like the sunrise itself, growing brighter and brighter, minute by minute.

Maybe it is fitting that our Easter celebration seems less extravagant than Palm Sunday. Happiness, like parades, is temporary. Easter Joy is eternal.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!
